- Fundraising for much needed charities with bake sales, events and opportunities



#### CHARITY & COMMUNITY.

This week we have 5 days' worth of events for Men's Mental Health month, to destigmatise gender roles, empower and educate our students on both physical and mental wellbeing.

Events include fundraising for Men's Mental health charities with a basketball and penalty shootout, an introduction to the gym, "England football teams take on Men's Wellbeing" being played in the Theatre and talks on "Celebrating all things Men" by staff. Please do encourage all our students to attend events from Monday 28/11- Friday 2/12. There will be something happening every day.

The charity committee are organising an "Anonymous Candy Cane Delivery" event to fundraise for Children in Need, where students have the chance to buy a candy cane (other optional sweets will be available), write a message and the charity committee will be delivering them through the month of December to both students and staff to kick start the month of giving.

We will be doing our annual reverse advent calendars for Fare Share Food Bank, where students can bring items of food and toiletries to give back to the community, empowering our students to see the difference they make. One can, one shampoo bottle, one bag of pasta, but a huge difference to the lives around us.

There will also be Bake sales happening on the last week of school for fundraising for different causes!

#### OUR TOWN.

When a whole school survey was shared for students to input their ideas on the main issues impacting their town, an overwhelming majority felt that more needed to be done to clean up the local environment. A social action group was formed, acting as changemakers to tackle litter and single-use plastics.

Madison, year 8, talked about the extent of littering in the area. "I noticed litter in the parks and the lakes when I take my dog for a walk. I wanted to get involved to help the local community". Ellie, year 8, shared similar motivations. She enjoys caring for the environment and has planted trees and flowers with her grandparents. "I wanted to make people more aware, and help Northampton be a better place to live. The area can be beautiful, and then you realise it's a great place to be".

Actions already taken by Abbeyfield's group include litter picks, letter writing, and meeting with the mayor of Northampton. Determined to tackle the root causes of littering, the group will be running a campaign to encourage behaviour change. They plan to deliver assemblies in local primaries, promote awareness throughout the school, and lead on re-use initiatives to encourage recycling. Carol Scrivener-Wallace, staff lead and Assistant Principal, talked about how the students have "engaged really well with the project. They've been really positive, and love wearing the high vis jackets for litter picks!"

Caleb, year 8, has been involved in the project since the start. He's enjoyed taking part in the litter picking and meeting the mayor last year who "listened to our concerns and the change we wanted to see".

Common things he's found include bottles, crisp packets, and plastic containers. He's keen to lead on more clean-up projects across the community. Reflecting on what he's learnt, he shared how he's discovered "that you can use rubbish to build so many different things".

In September 2022, year 8s in the group took on the challenge of repurposing rubbish to create a piece of artwork linked to Northampton's heritage. 30 year 8 students researched Northampton's history and monuments, before working in groups to develop a plan to replicate one of the town's famous buildings using resources from a recent litter pick.

Replicas of the Guildhall, Queen Eleanor Cross, Delapré Abbey, the National Lift Tower, Northampton's Cathedral and Sixfields stadium were created.

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Abbeyfield's event focused on repurposing rubbish and highlighting the extent of plastic use, whilst celebrating the rich

history of Northampton. Tina Casey, Teacher of Humanities and Drama, discussed how the History curriculum includes links to Northampton's heritage, and how the school plans to arrange talks from local historians, and visits to the Northampton battlefields and the Delapré Abbey.

Tina looks forward to starting a local history club in school. "I want people to be proud of being from Northampton, and to see what we can do as a school". After hearing the student presentations, Tina invited discussions from the group on how they could reduce plastic and encourage others to repurpose plastic on a more regular basis, leading to a host of innovative ideas to create change at Abbeyfield.

Abbeyfield School are very proud of four students who applied for the above role and have been successful in getting through to the next stage!


Namay S. Y11, Onyinye C-A. Y11, Oliver B. Y10 and Sara P. Y11 all impressed the judges with their passion and knowledge of STEAM. There were over 100 applicants across the UK; all four are currently preparing themselves for a face-to-face interview to secure one of the 20 places that are available.

This is a rare opportunity to be a voice for young people, as the future of education and industry partnerships develop. They will help lead in the directions and opportunities that they present to *The STEM Project* in subjects and interests that matter to them! They will develop skills as a business leader, building on their inter and intrapersonal skills.

Their freelance role will see them engaging with the wider STEM industry, building relationships, and assisting to organise

programmes aimed at the younger demographic in their chosen interests. They will be required to attend meetings (virtual and face-to-face), where possible (mainly over half terms) and join in projects that involve major brands and partners, as their participation and voice in these processes is critical in their overall success. Learning and engaging with leaders in STEM today, the young person will become a leader in the future of STEM by learning all they can in this role from the various influencers, industry professionals and freelancers.

We wish them all luck for their interviews and are very excited to see how they get on. We are confident that they will represent Abbeyfield Schools core values of Creativity, Honesty, Independence, Resilience, Respect and Responsibility through this role.

Our Y9 and Y10 girls were very lucky to attend a workshop delivered by Lisa White from the Automotive 30% Club and Amy Simpson, Social Media Marketing Manager at LKQ Euro Car Parts. This was part of the Automotive 30% Club's Inspiration for Innovation Network, Inspiring Automotive Women Week 2022.



The girls found Amy's career interesting and were inspired by her #ThisGirllsMe2022 story. They were all engaged and asked some brilliant questions. We are very grateful to be part of this programme which informs our students about the many career opportunities available within the automotive industry and helps to inspire our girls to consider a career in automotive.

This is some feedback from a few of the girls. Great to listen to how it has made them reflect on jobs in an industry that they would never have considered.

In my opinion, I really liked learning about all the separate jobs in the automotive industry, I enjoyed learning about the career pathways people can take to get into the industry and it has made me rethink what I would like to do as a job when I am older. I would like to see this again at school and for it to give a more in-depth description of all the different jobs that everyone can do. This way more females will be more interested in the automotive industry. The talk really inspired me to look further into the jobs in the industry and to try and plan out what I would like my career path to be.
