Why study Religious Studies?

Religious studies is a great subject that enables pupils to:

- Adopt and develop an understanding of both their own and other people's values and beliefs, gaining a greater sense of their own identity, values, opinions and attitudes in in regard to different religious perspectives.
- Encourage philosophical thought and decision-making skills, enabling students to discuss and analyse topics they encounter in society and through the media.
- Enhance their spiritual and moral development, and contribute to their health and well-being;
- Enhance their personal, social, and cultural development enabling them to think critically, listen empathetically, speak thoughtfully, and write clearly in regard to their understanding of different cultures locally, nationally and in the wider world.

Possible next steps (including careers)

GCSE Religious Studies provides an excellent route to study beyond the age of 16, both for Religious Studies A level and other post-16 qualifications. A qualification in Religious Studies is valuable for a wide range of careers, such as, law, medicine, care and social work, journalism, the civil service and teaching.
